Where does Leap Year Come From?

In 46 BC, Julius Caesar implemented a solar calendar of 365 days and an extra leap day every fourth year. Previous to his reform, the ordinary calendar of Rome consisted of 355 days with an occasional extra 22 to 28 day month inserted after February 23rd as needed to keep the start of the year roughly corresponding to the start of Spring. In principle, this worked well, except that the term of office for each Roman official. including the official in charge of the calendar, was set as one to three years. Since the pontifex could determine how long the year was to be, he could manipulate the term of office of his friends and foes. Caesar chose to use his power to control the calendar to decree a 455 day long calendar for his term as pontifex and to standardize the year going forward.

I am unsure who changed the start of the year from March to January. The result of that change is that September, (7th month) was now the 9th month of the year. Similarly, the formerly 8th, 9th, and 10th months became the 10th, 11th and 12th.

The new calendar yields a year of 365.25 days, which is actually longer than the solar year of 365.24217 days. As a result, the calendar drifted by about 3 days every four hundred years. To correct that, Pope Gregory XIII instituted a new calendar in 1582 that skipped three leap years every 400 years. When countries adopted that calendar, they had to drop some days from the current year to make up for the accumulated errors in the past. Thus, Octoberfest is actually held in September and the October Revolution that overthrew the Tsars occurred in September.



FFGS General Meeting Sun, Feb 18th 2 – 4 pm John Loacker, Kroll & Metsker Maps






February's General Meeting program was presented by John Loacker, owner of Kroll Maps and co-owner of Metsker Maps in Seattle. John gave an interesting historical presentation of Seattle's map usage and discussed how maps have changed over the years. He showed how old maps were made with glass plate solar prints and hand-colored maps. Computers started changing the way maps were made in the 1980s. He spoke of the advantages of the modern equipment that is now used, and some disadvantages of electronic maps that we use on phones and computers.

These are some of the maps needs that his company has filled over the years.

- Advertising businesses would have maps printed with their store locations
- Tourism displaying points of interest.
- Street maps showing bus routes
- Maps showing playgrounds or parks
- Maps that show electrical grids or other utilities
- Real Estate purchases what properties are vacant?
- School districts, voting districts, police precinct boundaries
- Lawsuit disputes over property

John showed some historical maps from Seattle's early days. He told us about some resources that he has used, and which are available to the public.

- LIDAR (Light Detection and Ranging) data. It is used to make high resolution maps.
- USGS Topoview download many free maps including historical maps.



Local Places worth exploring - Kenmore!

Located at the north end of Lake Washington, Kenmore is home to Kenmore Air, which has been flying float planes around the Pacific Northwest since 1946. It was started by three friends from high school working on a single floatplane in a garage on the site of an old shingle mill. They now fly seaplanes and wheeled planes to 45 destinations from Seattle. You may be familiar with their Lake Union location as well.

Kenmore is home to many beautiful parks including:

- Wallace Swamp Creek Park
- Swamp Creek Park
- Moorlands Park
- Linwood Park
- Sammamish River Burke Gillman Trail
- Tracy Owen Station at Log Boom Park (you may remember hearing of the 8 foot long, 300 pound white sturgeon that washed up along the waterfront a few feet from the swim beach at Log Boom Park mid September 2023.
- St Edward State Park, the original home of the St Edward's Seminary which was completed in 1931 and designed by notable Seattle architect John Graham Sr. His firm was also responsible for many notable buildings around the country including the Space Needle. St Edward's Seminary closed in 1976. Archbishop Raymond Hunthauseh had a vision of preserving the grounds as a state park. In 1977, the property and the majority of the land were sold to the State of Washington to become Saint Edward State Park. In 2017, Daniels Real Estate entered into a public – private partnership to preserve and transform the main bulding in The Lodge at St Edward State Park.
- **Rhododendron Park** is centrally located in the heart of Kenmore. This 13 acre park features one of the largest public collections of hybrid rhododendrons in the Northwest.

















A Japanese American Incarceration Camp in Colorado Is America's Newest National Park

More than 10,000 Japanese Americans were imprisoned at the Granada Relocation Center, also known as Amache, during World War II.





Teacher John Hopper and students at Granada High School have been working to preserve and maintain Amache since 1993. Working with other preservation groups, they located, reassembled and returned a water tower to the site.

Amache had military-style barracks, mess halls, a school, a hospital, a post office, a recreation center and other shared facilities. When the camp closed at the end of World War II, the federal War Assets Administration sold off many of its buildings. Today, Amache is mostly a bare plot of dusty grassland—all that remains are a few building foundations, the camp's original street grid and some of the flowers planted by internees.

Red Lentil and Cauliflower Soup



Ingredients (Recipe from Bob)

- 2 tablespoons neutral oil such as avocado or canola
- 1 large yellow onion (12 ounces), chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, minced or finely grated
- 1 tablespoon grated fresh ginger
- ½ teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/4 teaspoon ground turmeric
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 2 tablespoons tomato paste
- 1½ cups dried red lentils, rinsed and picked through to remove any stones
- 7 cups low-sodium chicken or vegetable broth plus more if needed
- ½ teaspoon salt, plus more to taste
- 4 cups bite-size cauliflower florets (from ½ medium head)
- l cup light coconut milk, plus more for optional garnish
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice, more to taste

Directions

- Heat the oil until shimmering in a 4-quart soup pot over medium heat
- Add the onion and cook, stirring until tender but not brown, 4 to 5 minutes
- Add the garlic and ginger and cook, stirring, until aromatic, 30 seconds
- Stir in the cumin, turmeric and cayenne pepper until aromatic, about 30 seconds
- Stir in the tomato paste to incorporate, followed by the lentils
- Add the broth and salt, bring to a boil
- Reduce the heat to medium-low and simmer, uncovered, for 15 minutes
- If the lentils have absorbed most of the broth, add more as needed. Start with 1 cup for a thick but soupy consistency
- Add the cauliflower and return the mixture to a boil
- Reduce the heat so the soup is at a simmer and cook until the cauliflower is soft, 20 to 25 minutes
- Remove from the heat, use an immersion blender to puree until smooth
- Stir in the coconut milk and lemon juice, taste, season with additional salt if desired.

Recipes from Bob: Tomato Soup



Ingredients

- 6 cups chopped fresh tomatoes
- One 14.5 oz can chicken broth
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- l large onion slice
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 or 2 teaspoons white sugar
- l teaspoon salt

Directions

- Combine tomatoes, chicken broth, garlic cloves, and onion in a stockpot over medium heat
- Bring to a boil, then gently simmer for about 20 minutes to blend flavors
- Blend ingredients in the stockpot with an immersion blender until smooth, remove any unblended items like tomato skins
- A blender or food processor can be used in lieu of an immersion blender
- Transfer soup to a second container
- Melt butter over medium heat in the empty stockpot
- Stir in flour to make a roux, whisking until the mixture turns medium brown
- Slowly whisk in a bit of the tomato mixture to prevent lumps from forming, then gradually stir in the rest of the soup
- Season with sugar and salt to taste
- Add basil or other herbs prior to serving if desired

Potato Leek Soup



Ingredients

- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1½ pounds trimmed leeks, cleaned and thinly cut
- 2 teaspoons kosher salt, plus more to taste
- 1¼ pounds Yukon Gold potatoes, unpeeled, cut into eighths
- 3 cups chicken or vegetable broth, or more as needed to adjust thickness
- l cup half-and-half
- l pinch cayenne pepper

Directions

- Melt butter in soup pot over medium-high heat
- Add leeks and salt, cover, cook until leeks begin to wilt
- Uncover, reduce heat to medium or mediumlow, cook until leeks are soft and almost paste-like, 30 to 40 minutes
- Place potatoes in uncovered pot; add chicken broth
- Adjust heat so mixture simmers slowly, cook until potatoes are soft
- Puree mixture with an immersion blender or in batches in a blender
- Whisk in half-and-half
- Heat over medium heat, add more salt as needed, and cayenne pepper
- Garnish as desired
- Serve with a hearty bread

Note: You'll need $1\frac{1}{2}$ pounds of leeks after they've been trimmed. Leave about an inch of the dark greens.
