

39 Fabulous Years - Ila Hemm in Friendship Force of Greater Seattle

Ila moved to Seattle in 1967 and was a Middle School Librarian for many years. After hearing about FFI from a friend in Iowa, Ila joined the Seattle Tacoma Club in 1985, one year after it was founded in 1984. Ila served as club secretary for several years along with various other committees.

Ila has many fond and humorous memories of her FF journeys. In Durham, England, Ila and Kay Frankenstein were roommates and the two of them got to share a twin bed at their host's home for that journey. She enjoyed her walk on Hadrian's Wall with Kay and her host.

On a journey to Bratislava and Budapest, Ila's roommate was Pat Nelson, who was up very early every morning to go for a run. For this journey, Ila was impressed with the government buildings. She saw special curved recesses in



the windowsills designed to hold the cigars of the politicians on break. On her journey to Hamilton, New Zealand, Ila discovered that she does not like Vegemite or Marmite. Perhaps you feel the same? On the other hand, Ila was impressed with Vienna's great coffee and pastries. Ila also went on journeys to Memphis, Tennessee, Lethbridge, Alberta, Orangeburg, South Carolina, Hartford, Connecticut & Salzburg.

Bob and Inga Freund were the coordinators for an exchange to Freiburg, Germany and greatly impressed Ila with their organizational skills and attention to detail. Bob and Inga were members of our club for many years before moving on to Olympia and joining the club there. Their last journey was with our club to Thailand.

Ila has had some interesting and/or strange experiences on journeys. On the 1994 Milwaukee, Wisconsin FF club to Brazil, they took the Corcovado railway to visit the Christ the Redeemer statue. At one stop they were given a sample of all the jewels found in Brazil. They continued on to Manaus to visit the beautiful Opera Hall and the many markets. Then they went to the Ariau Jungle Tower Hotel, where they stayed in wooden cabins and took canoe trips each day. A sloth was brought to them, and Ila was able to hold a small boa constrictor. Ila did not fish for piranhas, but others did, and ate them for dinner. She saw lots of coatimundis there and at Iguacu Falls. Also in Brazil, she had a day host who dropped her off at the host's home late at night, but it was a block of identical apartments. Ila didn't know which one was correct and she was worried about being outside all night. She knocked on several doors but was not able to communicate in Portuguese (before cell phones and google translate!) She finally found a security guard who spoke some English and he helped her find the right place.

In Memphis, there were two inbound groups on the same journey – FFGS and a Russian group. During the two weeks, members from the Russian club disappeared, one by one. She thinks they may have been secretly immigrating to the US!

In 2004, Ila went to China with a woman from FF. They visited a silk factory that sold scarves and comforters. She bought a silk comforter and still uses it on her bed. They went from Yangtze to the Shennong Ferry, and got into small sampan boats (8 $\frac{1}{2}$ meters x 2 meters), which were paddled by men until the river became shallow and rocky. Then the men got out and pulled the boats with ropes as they walked along the shore. They returned by ferry, and she said they could see coffins in caves, because the water lever was lowered due to the 3 Gorge Dam.

Ila has attended several Regional Conferences, including one where she met Mohamad Ali and Rosalind Carter! She marveled at Rosalind's electric handshake and vibrant personality. She thought the conferences were very informative and allowed people to meet other members from all over the world.

Ila has also traveled extensively with groups outside of Friendship Force including three trips to Japan. Her last trip was to Kauai with Kay to visit FFGS member Shirley Daughterman.

Ila shared that our club used to give short presentations for incoming clubs with various scenic attractions in Washington shown as pictures (salmon, Mt Rainier) or symbols (silver ribbons representing rain). Each club member talked about one item. The presentation was a hit even if they sometimes had to rely upon an interpreter. Ila's birthday is April 1st, so we wish her a belated happy birthday!



Did You Know? - - - Eclipse



Solar Eclipse

- 1. A solar eclipse occurs when the moon passes between the earth and the sun, blocking our view of the sun.
- 2. It can only occur on a new moon when the sunlit side of the moon faces away from the earth.
- 3. The next total eclipse visible in the United States will occur on 23 August 2044 but will only cross Montana and North/South Dakota. 12 August 2045, a total eclipse will span coast to coast.
- 4. The sun's diameter is 400 times that of the moon but the sun is also about 400 times farther away from the moon an amazing cosmic coincidence that has the moon precisely covering the sun's face when the two align.
- 5. Since the moon is gradually moving away from the earth, we just happen to exist at a time when the moon and sun appear almost identical in size, something no longer possible in 50 million years.

A solar eclipse helped prove Einstein's theory of general relativity.

"During the total solar eclipse on May 29, 1919, the scientists were amazed as the stars seemed displaced from their usual locations because their light traveled to Earth on a curved plane around the sun. The light was deflected by around 1.7 arc seconds, just as Einstein had predicted, proving the physicist's idea that gravity isn't a force but a geometric distortion of space-time. Thanks to the experiment, the Royal Astronomical Society officially recognized Einstein's theory of general relativity on November 6, 1919, roughly four years after its publication."

FFI North American Regional Conference - October 7 - 10, 2024, Milwaukee, WI





Capturing Yosemite's gorgeous and elusive natural 'firefall'



"California's Yosemite National Park is full of natural wonders. But at a certain time each year, photographers and visitors from all over gather hoping to see something extra special. Horsetail Fall is a seasonal waterfall that spills off the eastern face of the iconic El Capitan rock formation. For a couple weeks in winter, just before sunset, the light hits in such a way that the water glows gold and yellow, like lava. They call it the 'firefall.'"

Helping Care for Duwamish Sacred Places

<u>Duwamish Hill Preserve, Tukwila Green Tukwila Partnership</u>

Duwamish Hill is a sacred site of the Duwamish Tribe; we are honored to help in stewarding this special area by planting native plants in the forest and creation of a new pollinator meadow. Efforts also include removing invasive plants, soil improvement and mulching. Also included are special speakers and the launch of the Geocache Adventure Tukwila Legacy Trail. This is a sacred place referred to in the Duwamish Epic of the Winds story.

Cecil Moses Park, Tukwila King County Parks

Cecil Moses Park is located along the west bank of North Wind's Weir. in the critical transition zone for young salmon moving downstream to Puget Sound with an extensive tidal mixing of fresh and salt waters which allows the young salmon to adapt from the fresh water of the Green-Duwamish River to the salt water of Puget Sound.. Work continues to improve the habitat quality of this important area by removing invasive plants, replacing them with native plants and mulching. We are honored to help in stewarding this sacred place of the Duwamish Tribe, which is referred to in their Epic of the Winds story.

Herrings House Park, Seattle Green Seattle Partnership/Seattle Parks

Herrings House Park is part of the Duwamish ancestral site of the Duwamish ha?apus Longhouse and adjoins ha?apus Village Park along the river and provides the largest salmon habitat in the lower part of the river. This critical area for the juvenile salmon provides them a safe place to rest and forage for food before they enter Puget Sound. Volunteers will be renovating an area which will feature native plants that are important to the Duwamish culture and connect with the Longhouse, along with mulching and removing invasive plants. Also included are special speakers and tabling offering information about the river, its wildlife and efforts to improve its health.

halapus Village Park and Shoreline Habitat, Seattle Port of Seattle & DIRT Corps

This is a sacred site of the Duwamish Tribe, being an ancestral location of one of the tribe's Longhouses and located across the street from the Duwamish Longhouse and Cultural Center. We are honored to help in stewarding this special area by planting native plants, removing invasive plants to create a healthy habitat along the river. Also included are special speakers and tabling offering information about the river, its wildlife and efforts to improve its health.
